In March, the vestry attended a diocesan workshop on diversity and inclusion – Building the Beloved Community Across Differences. We learned and talked about all the variations of diversity, and ways to be more inclusive and welcoming as a church. During our vestry meetings this year each of us has shared the things that make up our cultural identity. It's been interesting to learn more about where we all come from and the paths we've taken to Trinity.

We've had some changing of the guard midyear. Ken Emerson moved away to be closer to family, leaving our junior warden position and a vestry spot open. Mary Hill bravely stepped up as junior warden and Cheri VanGelder filled the vestry opening. Many thanks to both these ladies! Another big change was the well-earned "retirement" of our treasurer Mark Hill. He saw us through some rough waters, and helped institute some new safeguards and practices in our money management. Now Lori Bowerman has transitioned from bookkeeper to treasurer.

Committees are the new superpowers, it seems. In 2017 we've seen some fabulous work driven by dedicated committees. The Building and Grounds committee did so many things that we didn't need to notice, but also managed a major teardown and rebuild of our handicap ramp. The Strawberry Festival and Wild Game Dinner committees both broke records. The Outreach committee continues to be a major link to the community, supporting groups that share our ministry.

The Stewardship team and the Finance Committee deserve great thanks for doing key but sometimes thankless jobs. It can be uncomfortable to ask for and talk about money.

We are blessed with people who care enough to face these challenges with practicality and faith.

In 2017, Trinity also became a member of DRIVE – Detroit Regional Interfaith Voice for Equity. The DRIVE team here conducted a listening campaign to build relationships within the church and work to discern what our membership feels drawn to as mission.

As we look ahead to 2018, I hope we can continue to build Trinity as a parish. Some of my favorite events have been ones that welcomed community beyond our membership – Jazz nights, Trunk or Treat, Wild Game dinner and of course Strawfest. I hope that we continue to shine brightly with the light of Christ and draw others to the beloved community.

RECTOR'S REPORT

2017 IN REVIEW

Wins

There is much to celebrate in the year gone by. Highlights from the year include:

- Some new folks stepping into leadership roles (per Annual Meeting Awards)
- A brand new ramp, accomplished with the leadership of the revitalized Buildings and Grounds team
- Several "Jazz Café" nights that have built community among church members and others who came out to hear the music.
- Ongoing outreach on the part of our Worship team through events like Pet Blessing, Ashes to Go, etc.
- Almost complete reimbursement for expenses related to a previous employee's financial misbehavior.
- A record-breaking fundraiser for Adopt-a-Child-Size featuring 3 choirs.
- More great liturgies: Jazz Mass, All Saints, Veterans, the Silent Film Advent Pageant, Lessons and Carols to go with chicken soup, etc.
- A new affiliation with Detroit Regional Interfaith Voices for Equity (DRIVE), which has helped us to create a Listening Campaign and discern some new outreach ministries for 2018.
- Incredible generosity on the part of 9 church members who responded to our post-stewardship letter by giving or pledging an additional \$8,025 for 2018.

Struggles

There are also some difficult realities we need to confront:

- We have experienced a continued drop in attendance and financial giving at the church. This trend has forced us to cut our budget for 2018 to the bone, and still operate with an expected deficit. In the long run, it is unsustainable.
- Our youth program is trying hard to maintain it's footing amidst dwindling numbers and reduced time
- Several congregational leaders have passed on to glory, or moved away from the area.
- Challenges remain around integrating newcomers into longtime friend-groups in the church and embracing/trying new things.

Let me not mince words. Similar things are happening at many churches around the country. Nonetheless, these challenges are threatening our ability to continue offering the programs and operating at the staffing level that we currently do.

Pastoral Care

Deacon Richard and I devote a great amount of time to parishioners, and others in Trinity's orbit, who encounter health problems, hard times, or other major challenges. Between us, we have made over 50 visits to folks who are shut in or were hospitalized in 2017. That doesn't count many of the other kinds of visits and appointments we keep--several dozen more at least.

Diocese

I have continued to chair our diocese's Diversity and Inclusion Team and its ongoing effort to create a new, more meaningful conversation around race and diversity, as I will for the foreseeable future.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2018

Hope

Research indicates that thriving churches do a number of things well:

- They create **a sense of belonging**, often by building community and meaning through small groups, and by constantly inviting and making room for others.
- They have **a sense of purpose in mission to the community** around them: they are engaged in having a positive impact on other lives.

They keep trying new things. "Because we have always done it this way" is not a legitimate
argument for them. They become learning organizations in which mistakes or failures are really
opportunities to learn.

Priorities

In light of this research, and the struggles mentioned above, I have several *priorities for the coming year*:

- **Create small groups**. Our upcoming Wednesday Lenten series will be a first trial of this. The point is to break open some of our usual social groupings, build community and belonging, and invite new people in. Please sign up to come!
- Launch some new outreach ministries that truly connect us beyond our walls. Our DRIVE Team is the engine behind this effort, and will present the ideas we are currently exploring in the meeting. As of this writing, we are considering:
 - A weekend bag-of-food program for kids in our school system who are food insecure at home.
 - Volunteering at the library to help adults with computer skills, literacy, job applications or other needs.
 - o Mentoring and supporting kids who have just aged out of foster care.
- Reach out to local entities to explore ways to *make our buildings a community resource*.
- *Improve our advertising*. There's a lot of great stuff at Trinity that needs to be broadcast more widely and invitingly. We will try to be better at providing ways to do this, and we need your help in actually doing it! Post a flyer in public, invite a friend to an event, etc.

2017 ANNUAL DEACON'S REPORT

I truly honored again, to serve as your Deacon, as I have for the past nine years, assisting at the altar at the 8:00 AM and 10:30AM services as well as Christmas Eve services, the Easter Vigil and Easter. I made many pastoral care visits to parishioners or a member of a parishioner family in hospitals, nursing homes, rehabilitation facilities, hospice facilities, and private homes, often providing Communion to those I visited giving patients and families both prior to and following surgery offering prayers for comfort and thanksgiving. I preached three times in 2017. I officiated or assisted at eight funerals for Trinity families and assisted at several baptisms. It is our hope to have another concert with the Ford Motor Company Chorus, Trinity Choir, Belleville Community Choir and perhaps choirs from other churches.

We still need volunteers to help with shopping and assembling outfits. It is our expectation to begin again in September and have the outfits out before Thanksgiving.

2017 CEDAR WOODS OUTREACH MINISTRY REPORT

Cedar Woods is an assisted living facility located on the I-94 Service Drive which has been served by members of Trinity for at least 25 years. This is one of the major outreach ministries which Trinity participates in.

Each month, usually on the first Sunday, we conduct a service of hymns, scripture readings, prayers similar to our Prayers of the People, and conclude the service with Communion. After the service, we recognize anyone having a birthday in the month which we're in and sing Happy Birthday and then give cookies, cupcakes, soft drinks and visit with the residents. We conduct our services in the main dining room, which is easier for folks with disabilities to maneuver around. Our attendance

decreased slightly from last year, mainly because of renovations to making most of the rooms private or semi-private. We hold an annual Christmas Party taking the place of our normal Cedar Woods Sunday service and we're blessed to have many of our young people join us in singing music of the season.

We are blessed with the members of our congregation who help in the services and the birthday celebration; they are a wonderful ministry team and are very dedicated. We invite anyone interested in giving up two hours, once a month, to join our team, we'd love to welcome them. A person does not have to attend each month. This is a wonderful outreach of our parish and we can tell by the faces of those who attend our services, we are truly appreciated.

Finally, we all mourn the loss of longtime member of the Cedar Woods ministry, George Wilhelmi. George served this ministry since inception over 25 years ago. Before we were blessed with two piano players, he was the one who basically had everyone singing the hymns. Later, he was joined by Jamie Owen and, even after we were blessed with our piano players, he'd be involved with our music, and he really put his heart in it on many of the hymns. He is greatly missed by our ministry team and those who attend our services who knew George. We are sure he is now singing with the choir of angels. May he rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon him.

2017 Blood Drives

Trinity worked with the American Red Cross to sponsor two blood drives in 2017, one in April, and the other in August. Our work is part of a larger effort in Belleville that includes other churches and loyal blood donors. Our efforts were particularly needed since the Red Cross was facing dangerously low blood supplies and was in emergency appeal mode. In August, we signed up 41 donor volunteers, at least 10 of which were Trinity members. Not all volunteers were able to successfully donate, which underscores the need for lots of people to care enough to help out the effort.

This year's Trinity Blood Drive results were: April-Pints Collected -31, August-Pints Collected -29 The total of 60 pints could be used to help over 180 patients

We will continue in 2018 to work with the Red Cross and the Belleville community in this life saving ministry. Trinity Blood Drive dates will be April and August.

DRIVE

The DRIVE team was started in the spring of 2017 as a local branch of a regional broad-based organizing collective of churches. (DRIVE stands for Detroit Regional Interfaith Voices for Equity.) Initially, the team held a listening campaign to get the pulse on the passions, concerns, and energies of our congregation. Members held a number of one-to-one conversations with parishioners. Out of this work, we discerned some patterns. These included:

- a love of Trinity's diversity and community
- a sense of overwhelm and fatigue on the part of some church members
- a difficulty experienced by some newer parishioners in truly becoming integrated into the church community

The DRIVE Team also feels a collective calling to find new ways for the church to make a difference (and become known) in the community around us. With all this in mind the Team has been talking about ways to make our physical plant more of a community resource in Belleville. We are also currently exploring three possibilities for church ministries:

- A backpack food program, providing kids in our school system who are food insecure some nonperishable food to help them get through the weekends.
- Volunteering at the library in some kind of adult literacy, computer, or job hunting skills.
- Finding a way to engage with and mentor kids who are aging out of the foster care system.

At the regional level, DRIVE is launching a campaign to recruit additional churches and other institutions as members. The goal is that the organization will double to about 60 member institutions, at which point we will discern and start advocating for a platform of changes/commitments that we want to see in our region (perhaps in education, transportation, or other areas mutually agreed upon). While this will give our people a voice at the decision-making table, engaging business leaders and politicians, it is not partisan work.

Currently our Trinity DRIVE Team includes co-chairs Gabby Burton and Carrie DeJonghe, Cyndi Hernandez, Mary Finn, Lori and Mike Bowerman, Martha Hanoian, Jim Pedersen, and Pastor Ian. More members are welcome!

2017 ANNUAL ACOLYTE REPORT

Acolytes are a very important part of our Sunday worship service. They light and extinguish the candles and lead the procession into the church with a Crucifer and two Torchbearers. They lead the Gospel procession out into the congregation and the Torchbearers stay with the Gospel book and light the way for the reading of the Word. They assist the Deacon in preparing the altar for Communion and assist the Celebrant during the service as needed. At the end of the service, they lead the recession out of the church. Presently there are 10 youth members who serve as Acolytes.

Operations

Trinity Episcopal Church Financial Summary 2017

Overall Operations: Trinity finished off the year with a \$28,491 operating deficit, a \$6,821 greater deficit than budgeted. This was primarily due to a \$12,395 shortfall in contributions (pledge payments, non-pledge member donations, and plate collections). Overall expenses came in \$6,769 under budget which help offset the revenue gap.

Blend Fund: The balance in the Blend Fund increased from \$745,415 to \$842,470. Although the principal balance cannot be spent per the trust, Trinity continues to benefit from the dividend proceeds of the endowment fund. In 2017, Trinity received \$29,405 in dividends from the fund which were used for operations, education, and capital per the trust document.

Endowment Fund: In 2005 Trinity established the 'Trinity Endowment Fund' governed by a trust document. A portion of the funds in the trust are managed through Edward Jones and the remaining at the Diocese. The Edward Jones account increased from \$67,746 to \$81,172 during 2017. The Growth & Income fund balance had seen an increase from \$105,248 to \$122,433. The funds held in the trust may not be used for operations; however, the Endowment Committee, with Vestry approval, will be able to use a portion of the 2017 income for outreach and special projects.

Capital Funds: The Buildings & Grounds Committee was busy this year doing great things with Capital Fund Donations. Below is a summary of Capital Fund receipts and expenditures.

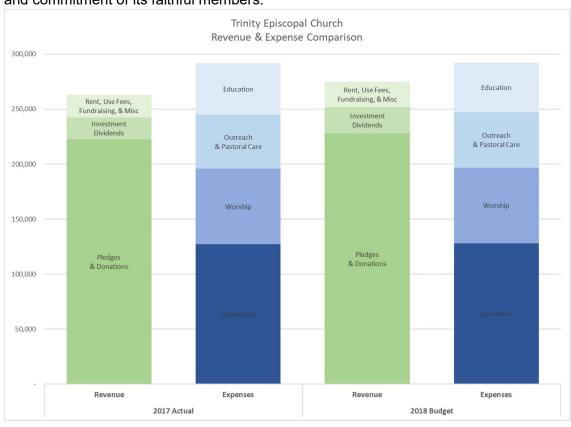

2017 Buildings and Grounds Annual Report

There were a number major projects completed in 2017.

First, the purchase of a new lawn mower made it possible for the church to continue to maintain the lawns during the growing season through the help of the parishioners, saving Trinity thousands of dollars over a mowing service.

Next, the appearance of the church was improved through painting and other interior updates, lighting improvements and parking lot repair.

Lastly with the help of a generous group of able bodied parishioners and those that provided nourishment, over the course of a long weekend in October, we removed the old decking surface on the handicap ramp and replaced it with a composite decking, just in time for winter.

2018 will bring more projects and with the success of the projects in 2017, we are looking forward to being able to self-perform as many as possible, keeping expenses to a minimum.

Memorial Garden

Another year, the twenty-eighth has passed and the garden continues to be a haven for those who wish to find a place of serenity and peace. TI is also a haven for the birds, rabbits and squirrels. The Garden was consecrated on May 7, 1989 by Bishop Irving Mayson. In the spring the blooming trees, shrubs, beautiful flowers gives us a piece of natures' beauty and enhances the peaceful atmosphere of the garden.

Again this year the irrigation system was maintained by Randy Brown- Gardener's Choice. Belleville Greenhouse helped out with some of the landscaping by removing of tree limbs and clean up. The beautiful Olive Tree outside of the garden is dying so we work hard by trimming the dead branches and water frequently. Par Marshall takes care of the watering outside the Garden and Virg trims the trees and shrubs.

Mo Altizer was instrumental in placing the name plaques on the wall of the people who are interred and preparing the plots. He also trimmed the burning bushes. New Flowers and bulbs were planted once again by Virg who also did the weeding, pruning, and removal of dead flowers. Another year, Robson Greenhouse generously donated the annuals for inside and outside the garden. Special thanks to the lawnmower crew who faithfully mowed the lawn.

We had four interments for long term members, Dick Martin, George Wilhelmie, Rae Thom and Dorris Novak Also interred Ronnie Gilson. Pastor Ian held short service for the relatives and friends.

As of December 2017, 53 interments and 93 plots donated. We no longer sell plots but as for donations.

Tommy Smith, our electrician replaced some lights and wiring. We are thankful for Tommy's help.
